

Treasures from the National Museum: On the maritime routes of ancestors

Here, the National Museum's Director General, Jamal al-Moosawi, and the Head of Curatorial Unit, Moza al-Wardi, take us on the maritime routes of Oman's legendary seafaring ancestors - on board the ship Sohar. (With photography by Saleh al-Ruzaqi/The National Museum).

The sewn-plank ship Sohar was built in Sur and named after the historic Omani seaport. In 1400-01 AH/1980-81CE, she sailed from Oman to China, retracing the routes of early Islamic seafarers who had established what was at the time the longest sea-trading route in the world (9,600 km). Sohar demonstrated that a sewn boat could sail all the way to China. The original ship now stands on the roundabout near the al-Bustan Palace Hotel.
